After the demise of our founder the late **Thomas Nunotani** in 1995, LACA has existed for 14 years and rendered annual scholarships, awards/grants and bonded through fellowship events. 

# Honoring the past, enriching the future!

We are humbled and privileged to report to you that support of the Lana'i Culture & Heritage Center (Lana'i CHC) has been great. Since opening our doors as a non-profit community heritage center on October 1st, 2007, we have hosted more than 4,500 participants in our programs; raised more than \$40,000.00 through community donations; received a commitment of \$50,000.00 a year for three years from Castle & Cooke, along with use of the present center; received a gift from Ho'opa'a i ka Na'auao in the amount of \$61,000.00; secured a \$30,000.00 grant from Maui County and the Hawai'i Tourism Authority; and received a major grant of \$750,000.00 from the Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs to help develop a permanent home for the Lana'i CHC.

Our goal is to ensure that the legacy of Lana'i remains an integral part of our community. Over the last ten months many efforts have been initiated and options explored to make a permanent home for the Lana'i CHC. After lengthy discussions between our board members with Castle & Cooke, program specialists and interested parties, we have determined that the most secure route for a sustainable future of the Lana`i CHC is to seek available property in Lana`i City on which to set the foundation of the heritage programs. The vision is to develop both fixed exhibits (more typical of museum settings for valued items) and living history collections, where Lana`i's residents and visitors can experience the heritage of Lana'i.

We are also planning a controlled archival collection storage and conservation area, and community heritage library, which will house historical documents, photos, maps, textiles and other items of importance to Lana`i's people and past.

To make this community vision a reality, and to ensure that the programs are sustainable, we need the help of everyone who cares for Lana`i. Many hands will make the work easy to complete. We are now preparing to enter into a capital improvements fundraising campaign to secure a site, and your help is needed. If we are to protect and pass on Lana`i's history, we need families to donate cherished items reflective of the diverse cultural heritage of Lana`i. If we are to be good stewards of the artifacts and historical collections, and ensure that the rich history of Lana`i is passed on to future generations, we need a larger facility and financial support to offer the programs.

We hope that you might support the Lana`i Culture & Heritage Center, by sharing history and important materials of our past, and through contributions to our fundraising efforts. Your monetary donations are tax-deductible, and you will also have the satisfaction of knowing that you are helping to pass on the legacy of Lana`i's heritage to future generations.

The Lana`i CHC is presently located in the Old Dole Administrative Building (Room 126), at 730 Lana`i Avenue, and is open Monday through Friday, from 8:30 am to 3:30 pm. ### Profile of Rosalinda P. Degamo

Rosalinda Pascua Degamo was born on August 27, 1936, in Hawi (Big Island). At the age of six she left the Big Island and moved to the island of Maui to live under the guardianship of her eldest sister, Carolina "Helen" (Calixto) Sonido in the small sugar plantation town of Pu'ukoli'i. At age 11 she then moved to the island of Lana'i where she entered the 6<sup>th</sup> grade in Lana'i High & Elementary School (LHES) until she graduated in 1954.

In 1956 she married **Victor D. Degamo** and had four children, **Victor Jr.** (1957), **Juan** (1960), **Helinda** (1963) and **Calvin** (1965). All of whom are LHES alumni. Through the 1970's while raising her four young children through their formative and school years, she worked for Dole Company as a supervisor during the summer seasons and worked for the State of Hawai'i Department of Education's TESL (Teaching English as a Second Language) Program during the school year. However, when the TESL program had ended and discontinued, she took a position as a Teacher's Aide and continued working for

Dole in the summers and eventually became a regular supervisor until the pineapple industry of Lana'i phased out in the late 1980's and ultimately retired in 1998 at age 62.

In the 1980's she was the Lana'i Alumni Association contact person with the late **Tommy Nunotani** as president. Through collaborative planning with alumni on neighbor islands, Linda had a vital role in planning for the Lana'i High and Elementary School 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration. In 1995, LACA evolved from the Lana'i Alumni Association. This year, she is one of the incoming LACA directors.

Currently, she is an active "kupuna" member in the Lana'i MEO (Maui Economic Opportunity) Program. In the program she enjoys playing the ukulele and dancing the hula where it has given her many opportunities to travel and entertain Senior and public events on Maui as well as locally on Lana'i with Hula Halau O Lana'i Ka'ula. In her spare time she enjoys cooking and baking and volunteering her time to help and aide her fellow senior cohorts at Hale Kupuna O Lana'i.

### Profile of John Keola Kauwenaole

After 33 years with the Honolulu Police Department, **John Kauwenaole** retired in December 2008. As a graduate of the LHES class of 1968, John left Lana'i to attend college in California and later at Church College of Hawaii aka Brigham Young University in Laie and majored in Police Science.

Since 1975, his service covered areas in East Honolulu, Pearl City, Waianae and Wahiawa. He worked in details like in Juvenile Prevention as a DARE Instructor and Traffic Enforcement as a Motorcycle Officer. In 1997 he was promoted to the rank of sergeant. The following year, he was assigned as the first Weed and Seed Supervisor in the state. Weed and Seed is a crime fighting strategy that deals with gang and drug

activities in targeted locations. He helped communities rebuild by bringing into those areas service providers, city and state assistance agencies.

He worked tirelessly to decrease crimes in the public housing complexes in the Kalihi area. To combat drug dealing in Kalihi, he collaborated with the FBI, DEA (Drug Enforcement Agency), U.S. Marshalls, U.S. Attorney General, State Probation and parole officials.

It's no wonder he was nominated for the Sergeant of the Year and won the overall Officer of the Year award in 1999! As a retiree, he continues making an impact in Kalihi as a Reserve Police Officer.

Susana graduated from Lana'i High School in 1950. The following year she got married in Honolulu to Max Kincaid, USN. Their three children are: Max Kincaid, Jr., Ramona Kincaid-Powell and Marina Longfellow.

The family moved to California in 1957 and lived in San Diego and later in Bakersfield. Sue was active in the PTA and was the elementary school photographer. In 1961 the family returned to Hawaii. When her daughters Ramona and Marina were in scouting, she volunteered for three years as a Brownie Leader.

After being discharged from the Navy, employment opportunity beckoned and the family moved to Midway for two years and to Subic Bay in the Philippines for seven years. Max Jr., went back to Lana'i after six months and attended Lana'i High School. When he graduated his parents and sisters attended the commencement ceremony. Ramona and Marina both graduated from George Dewey High School in Subic Bay.

Of course, they never listened and always over bought and the overage was always brought back to the store. After 14 years at the Exchange she retired.

Sue is a member of the Lana'i Alumni and Community Association. She is one of the incoming directors and serves on the membership committee. During Tina Mendes' administration she was the Vice President. Meetings were held at Farrington High School.

# LACA Alumni News

It's been sixty-three years since the Class of 1946 graduated from Lana'i High School and sixty-two years that the Lana'i High and Elementary School logo has existed. Herbert Watanabe, an exemplary alumnus who has excelled in educational, community, and church endeavors, designed the logo. In retrosopect, Herbert is a LACA Charter member and belongs to the Lana'i Hale Club comprised of \$1,000 up donors.

I was delighted when Herbert responded to my voice phone message and accepted to relate the history of the Lana'i High and Elementary School logo.

# **History of the LHES Seal**

#### By Herbert Watanabe

During the 1945-1946 school year, I served as a member of the Lanai High School Student Council by virtue of being the Editor-in Chief of the school yearbook, KA HOKU. The student body president was Goro Hokama. During the course of the year, I realized that Lanai High School did not have a school seal or logo.

Upon graduating from Lanai High and just prior to my departure from Lanai to attend college in Wisconsin, I set out to design a school seal. I presented the proposed seal drawn in black ink to Sakae Nakama (now Sakae Loo), a good friend, and suggested she introduce the proposal of adopting the seal for Lanai High School.

I was delighted to learn that the seal I designed was adopted by the Student Council of 1946 – 1947. The president of the student body then was **Shigeto Minami**. The seal as originally designed and adopted depicts "the original alma mater." During the 1945 – 1946 school year, the school's alma mater was lengthened by what is now the first verse which starts *Lanai High our alma mater*, pleasant memories ne'er forgot.

The seal I designed depicts pictorial symbols from the original alma mater where the lyrics start out...

In the isle of golden pine (the pineapple)...

torch to Hawaii's youth (the torch)...

Lanai High in splendor shine (the rays in the background)...

Tropic mountains echoes ring (the mountains in the background)

The six stars represent the six grades 7-12 that make up the student body of the high school division.

ASLH stands for the Associated Students of Lanai High.

1938 is the year the high school was established.

A few years ago, the students of Lanai High altered the original seal by adding a Norfolk pine. The pineapple, torch, mountain, rays, ASLH, six stars all remain on the seal. The Lanai Alumni and Community Association (LACA) continues to use the original design.

Of Interest: The school colors of Lanai High School were originally Black and Gold. That was due to the influence of many of the teachers in the early years who were alumni of McKinley High School where the school colors are Black and Gold. We even had a song that started with Black and Gold is waving...a song sung at McKinley High School to this day. Lanai High School colors changed to green and gold to reflect the colors of the pineapple.

The current site of the school was once a thriving vegetable garden that was a business venture of the Minami family (Kiyoshi Mana's dad) that provided much of the vegetables for Lanai.



# Class of 1959: 50th Reunion.


