Once-in-a-Lifetime EPIC Celebration on Lana'i

The Lana'i High School (LHS) 75th Anniversary Celebration held on July 5-7, 2013 on Lana'i is now looked upon as being the LARGEST gathering of LHS alumni EVER anywhere. Nearly 500 alumni from more than 35 classes representing SIX generations of alumni of 1940's on to the present were on island to take part in the once-in-a-lifetime weekend of events:

Friday July 5, 2013

It was a beautiful sunny morning as preparations were underway for the opening of the 1988 LHS 50th Anniversary Celebration time on the school campus. A crowd of nearly over 100 alumni gathered near the *outdoor stage*. to witness the opening of the time capsule. An informal program took place with LHS Athletic Director (and '90 LHS alumnus), Roderick "Sumi" Sumagit



welcoming everyone back "home" to Lana'i for the big anniversary weekend. Before the actual opening of the time capsule, LHS Principal (Ret.) Pierce Myers was introduced to say a few words or welcome as well. The time capsule was then opened. Out from its chambers were a half a dozen sealed



PVC pipe tubes all containing items that were "buried" 25 years ago and had not seen the light of day since 1988.

That same afternoon the items in the PVC pipe tubes were taken out and were put on display in the school cafeteria for alumni and the general public to view. Items on display were letters HAND-WRITTEN by elementary

students (who are all now alumni themselves) all sharing how they see themselves in 25 years. There were hundreds of pictures, as well as all sorts of knickknacks and trinkets.

The opening of the 25 year capsule was well attended. The contents were displayed in the school cafeteria. There was a good turnout for the parade, where possibly 22 classes participated. Lots of people turned out to watch the parade which was delayed for the tail end to pass. Lots of food, music and dancing were had at the pot luck in the bowling alley. At the Pineapple Festival held from 3 to 9 on Saturday, there was a good turnout. A fireworks display concluded the event. Gatherings for class reunions and families continued at Manele on Sunday.

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Also on display in the cafeteria were Memory Boards shared by participating alumni classes with pictures and memorabilia of their LHES school days. A program to officially kick off the LHS 75th Anniversary Celebration weekend took place with guest speakers such as recently retired LHS Principal, Mr. Pierce Myers, former LACA President and original LACA board member during the Tommy Nunotani presidency, Rosita Viduya-Hueu, 2012-13 Associated Students of Lana'i High (ASLH) Student Body President, Megan Amby, former LHS Principal (Ret.) Mr. Howard Sakamoto, and 2013-14 ASLH Student Body

President, **Tyler Pascua**. A performance was also shared by Mr. Matt Glickstein and his elementary school student members of the Lana'i Academy of Performing Arts. Also at this event alumni registration and check in took place. Containers were issued to classes who wish enter items to put in to the 2013 Time Capsule scheduled to be opened in 2038 for the LHS Centennial (100th) Anniversary.

Later that same evening at the *bowling alley* the annual LHS Alumni Throwback Dance Party V took place. This event was first held in 2009 as a way for the LHS class of '77 to celebrate turning the *Big* 5-0 dubbing



the event as a "Birthday Bash". The following year the class of '78 followed suit. In 2011 however, the event was renamed as the LHS Alumni Throwback Dance Party, which is now held annually the Friday before the Pineapple Festival. Year after year since 2009 this event has grown to epic proportions as scores of alumni and their classes would plan their reunions to be held during this particular weekend which is now known as the Pineapple Festival/LHS Alumni Reunion Weekend. The evening started with a pot luck dinner now traditionally "hosted" by the class who's turning the Big 5-o. This year's class was the class of '81.

Live music was provided by reunited members of school rock bands of the 60's and 70's. Dancing also took place until after midnight.

Saturday July 6, 2013

Excitement filled the air around town square Saturday morning as preparations were underway in Dole Park for the annual Pineapple Festival. Meanwhile however, down at the school parking lot where LHS alumni gathered readying themselves for the LHS 75th Anniversary Celebration Parade of Classes. And although the majority of the participating classes chose to PROUDLY walk the parade route holding a class

The parade started at the school parking lot, down Fraser Ave, up 8th St, down Lana'i Ave, and down 7th St. At one point the parade encircled the ENTIRE parade route! The Grand Marshal of the parade was recently retired LHS Principal, Mr. Pierce Myers and his





lovely wife, Jessie (who is also an LHS alumnus class of '75). Throughout the parade classes proudly shouted out cheers and yells from their days at LHS. As the last class returned back to the school parking lot, Mr. Myers asked everyone to gather closer in the middle of the parking lot for the singing of the Lana'i High School alma mater. Then he announced and summoned all LHS alumni cheerleaders to lead the song. The SEA of alumni went wild as the cheerleaders made their way to the center. Mr. Myers then gave the honor to deliver the opening notes to class of '63 alumnus cheerleader, Royalene "Mamo" Aiona-Fernandez. "Lana'i High..." For many, they haven't sung the alma mater since their high school graduation. But once the song started, it all came back! It was all like being in high school once again. The

alma mater was sung with much PRIDE! There was not one dry eye in the crowd! It was a chicken skin moment. no one will forget for a long time to come.

After the parade classes went over to Dole Park to "kapu" a spot for their class to sit and relax during the annual Pineapple Festival later that afternoon with class banner and tent. During the first 3 hours of the festival (3:00-6:00pm), festival organizers gave the LHS 75th Anniversary Celebration the opportunity for alumni to share their talents and provide the entertainment to festival goers. BASILIIO MAGAOAY-INOCENCIA AGONOY POSTERITY CELEBRATES

"Laid To Rest" on a high norfork pine trees plateau of Lana'i are Basilio Magaoay and Inocencia Agonoy (maiden name), who dared to leave their homeland of the Philippines and ventured to the islands of the Pacific nearly a century ago. With a modest vision to spare of the good they were about to do, they laid the foundation for future generations to plant their roots in Hawaii and throughout the world.



In July, descendants of this Philippine-born couple reunited in San Diego, bringing together four generations, numbering 123 in all, to pay homage to them.

Papa and Mama were married in Bacarra, Philippines, in 1925. When their 1-year old girl, died in 1931, Mama followed Papa who migrated to Hawaii two years prior to labor in

the sugar cane fields. As they moved from one sugar plantation camp to another on the Big Island, Oahu, and Maui, six children were born. Eventually, the

With Ellison taken hold of the island, it is really a blessing that will be appreciated one generation from now. Since those that graduated in the late 40's to the early 50's are nearly 80 years or older, in all probability very few will still be on the island or had moved on to be with their children who had found a career for their own benefits.

Papa passed away in 1991 and Mama died in 2000.

Dubbed the Super Six by the younger generations, they organized reunions regularly when their own children were young. But as the families grew larger and moved apart, reunions were no longer feasible.

2001 was the last reunion attended by the six siblings and all their children. Last year, their children, called the "Third Generation" or the 23 Cousins, decided to give the Super Six a rest and organized the 2013 reunion.

Michele Ramirez Weinhouse, one of the 23 Cousins, along with cousin Pamela Magaoay Fowkes, spearheaded the reunion-planning endeavor.

"All of us cousins decided it was time for us to stepup and plan the reunion," Weinhouse said. "We wanted the reunion to be a time to honor our parents and grandparents."

Attendees ranged in age from 11 months to 85 years old. Of the four generations of families from the Basilio-Inocencia line, only five members were unable to attend.

"To have everyone here – all 23 Cousins, the grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and spouses – was an unforgetable feeling. Many of the descendants have married into other races which made the reunion a very interesting gathering," said Phil Camero, the eldest of the 23 Cousins. "The reunion was a rare and

important opportunity for the younger generations to learn from the second generation or Super Six. Growing up, the Super Six had nothing in terms of material things. But they loved each other, worked hard and honestly. Their main purpose was to pave the way for a better life for the entire clan."

Weinhouse and Fowkes planned three all-day parties, which included a spam musubi contest, volleyball tournament, beach party and a talent show. The festivities also included tributes to family members who had passed away. A descendant pedigree chart was drawn which showed 5 ancestral generations linked by Papa and Mama to the 4 younger generations. With mugged pictures inserted next to their names, the chart had become a major factor in knowing our ancestors.

"By talking about them, we honor them and keep them alive," said Fred Camero, Jr., of the Third Generation.

The family also took time to celebrate the six members of the fourth-generation who recently graduated from high school and are headed for universities. Collectively, their career plans, which include medicine, law, dentistry, and politics, are in steps of their parents who themselves are educators, engineers, military leaders, press secretaries, and entertainers.

It should be noted that the Super Six are all graduates from Lanai High and Elementary School. However, Inocencia went only to 5th grade and Basilio had only received a 3-month first-grade education before his family sent him away to become an indentured servant for a wealthy family.

"I know Grandpa Basilio and Grandma Inocencia are proud of their posterity," Weinhouse said. "And I hope our grandparents know how proud we are of them."

Noticing the quality of the younger generations, there is no doubt that in the future a descendant will step forward to serve and write the next chapter in our Family History . . .


