## **CLASS OF 1952 REUNION**

## **FULL CIRCLE**

I was born in Sprekelsville during the cane field plantation days delivered by a midwife as was many of us of that generation. I helped to care for seven siblings. Our home had a kitchen with dirt floors, an outhouse, and we gathered vegetables in the field. Then during the war our family

moved to Lanai. War time meant covering the windows with black paper so no light could be seen. There was curfew and sirens every night. I remember the emergency gas masks, the bomb shelters and the island's Japanese families being separated from us. Hardship faced everyone.

We all grew up together, whether Japanese, Korean, Filipino, Hawaiian, and so on. We were not taught to discriminate because we were all the same poor hard working plantation folks. We all ate home grown vegetables which my mom cooked it in a variety of ways for our family. Those plantation days taught us to be humble, forgiving as well as to be strong to survive the war time and hard work in the fields.

School lunches often had peas and carrots which I disliked. I only had two pairs of shoes growing up on Lana'i and both had to last as long as possible. I remember my first prom gown was white although during high school I wasn't allowed to go out alone

with boys. My father was very strict. I can still picture his leather belt, and guava or hibiscus branches smacking across my legs for childhood violations. In those days, it was not child abuse but the way all children were disciplined. Now I can thank my father for his strict ways as it molded me to understand family discipline was necessary with our large family.

Today, I can see how my childhood, my family and friends have all taught me to be more forgiving and loving towards all people and animals. I reflect on my poor youth to my middle age and now my senior years and see it as a full circle. A full circle from the hard plantation days to a more fortunate lifestyle today. I give thanks and give back to all who I can help.

There is a saying that says when you give it will come back tenfold. I believe that all kind acts will be returned many times over. That belief sustained me as I remember having my fortune told when I was in my 30s and it was read that I would have an illness. At that time, I prayed to change that negative fortune reading and by doing kind acts as much as possible. Now as a survivor, I believe that acts of kindness and a benevolent God has made me a better and stronger person today. Each morning, I greet the day with a smile, and give thanks as life is very precious and tomorrow is not promised. Yes indeed life is a full circle and we are all a part of that circle of life. God bless us all!

## Class of 1959 Memories

Nineteen hundred fifty-nine was an historic year for the Territory of Hawaii. After many years of attempting statehood the Territory finally became the 50th state on the 21 August. Other events followed with the election of William F. Quinn becoming the first governor of the State of Hawaii. In business and economics Henry J. Kaiser drew plans to develop Hawaii Kai and Ala Moana Shopping Center opened with Sears being one of the anchor stores. Included in the Arts/Science categories were James Michener's publication of "Hawaii", the eruption of Kilauea Iki, Don Ho's performance at Honey's in Kaneohe and the showing of "Gidget" which brought the surf culture to the screen. In world events the "Kitchen Debate" between Nikita Kruschchev and Richard Nixon was held and Fidel Castro lead a successful revolution in Cuba. The songs that were played came from Bobby Darin's "Mack the Knife", Frankie Avalon's "Venus",

Connie Francis' "Lipstick on Your Collar" to name a few.

Amidst all of this came the graduating class of 1959...what a year and what a class! We were 49 graduates who marched to Pomp and Circumstance in the old Lanai gym. Our guest speaker was **Ke Nam Kim**, a brother of one of our classsmates **Harry Lee**. We were honored to have him. Approximately a third of us went on to college, business school, and nursing schools on Oahu and on the mainland. We became teachers, engineer, nurses, medical technician, FBI agent, telephone supervisor...... We served our Country in the Army, Peace Corps and AID.

She had no formal art lessons but would pick up the brush and create her own style of acrylic and water color paintings. She was inspired by her younger artistic sister **Joice Alapag**.



## Irene Masocol Pacol (Class of 1956)



Greetings, everyone! My name is **Irene Masocol Pacol**. I was born on
Lanai and attended Lanai
High and Elementary
School up to the fourth
grade then moved to the
Big Island. I graduated
from Hilo High School and
pursued a profession in the

medical field. My dream came true and I graduated from the St. Francis School of Nursing.

For the past three years, I have been fortunate in being a lay volunteer and go to the Philippines to render medical surgical and dental service with Aloha Medical Mission. Volunteers pay the costs for their plane fare, food, and lodging but transportation for the medical volunteers to and from the hospital is provided. Surgical and dental services are free of charge but people are required to bring their own food, water, bed sheets, blankets, pillow and toilet paper. Mission volunteers, also, must supply their own toilet paper.

Unpleasant but a realistic experience is the unavailability of flushed toilets and having to dispose of soiled toilet tissue in waste baskets. To remedy that problem in the Kabankalan Hospital where we worked, a bucket of water was poured down the toilet then flushed. Another medical/health procedure carried out

is seeing young boys who have just been circumcised walking around with their legs spread and playing with other boys.

My last mission of March 2014 was in the town of Kabankalan on the island of Negros.

Negros is divided into two parts: Negros Occidental and Negros Oriental. The sugar capital of the Philippines is Negros Occidental. After the mission, my friends and I traveled to the island of Palawan for rest and recreation. While there I learned that Filipinos, like the Japanese, spoke different dialects. The dialect of the muslim woman who came from Mindanao was Marano, in Negros it's Hiliganon, from Cebu it's Cebuanon, and from Palawan it's Cayonon. Although poverty stricken, people in the Philippines are resilient. They appear happy strong, calm, very kind, respectful and gentle. They smile and raise their eyebrows in greeting others.

The past two years I went to the town of Talibon on the Visayan island of Bohol. In 2013 when the mission was over, I visited the town of Tabuelan on the island of Cebu in search of my father's family. It was such a thrill and gratifying moment when I finally got to meet my relatives!

I'm blessed in being able to make a difference as a medical missionary and give back to my roots in the Philippines. I am forever grateful that my parents came as immigrants to Hawaii and provided our ohana with better opportunities to succeed in life.
